# FROM THE PRINCIPAL

**Healthy Women: Healthy Girls** was the title of a conference I attended at the end of last term. Held in Auckland, New Zealand, the conference was organised by the Alliance of Girls' Schools Australasia and its theme nicely matched Lowther Hall's theme for 2005. The speakers were interesting, not least Lesley Max, the CEO of the Pacific Foundation for Health, Education and Parent Support. She referred to research which establishes a strong correlation between academic success and students from families where the family dinner table is the place for meals together. She also made the point that girls need role models of healthy women!

Attending the Alliance of Girls Schools Conference I recalled the mid 1990s when we ran the Alliance out of Lowther Hall, using the office at the rear of the Mansion and with Kate McConville (now our Music Administrative Assistant) as Administration Officer. While recognising that all schools can be good schools, the value of educating girls in girls' schools cannot be overestimated, for many and varied reasons.

The Healthy School is the theme of this edition of the Lowther News. It comes out not long after the start of the term in which we have switched to a healthy approach to the range of food and drink in the canteen. We hope that all are enjoying the benefits of better eating. Do not be fooled by words such as "lite", "diet" and "low fat"! How healthy are "health" or "sports" foods and drinks? My New Zealand experience reminded me of how misleading such phrases are and how important it is that we train our young people to find out the correct information about the contents of all foods and drinks.

## VISIONS OF ME

Year 10 student Ellen Smallhorn was awarded first prize in the Moonee Valley Arts and Photographic Exhibition 'VISIONS OF ME', held at the Incinerator Arts Complex during April. Year 10 Visual Arts students all submitted works to the exhibition.

The challenge for the girls was to create a visual representation of how they perceived themselves and their future. They were required to explore their innermost thoughts as part of the creative process.

Ellen used mixed media in her entry which features symbols of the way she sees her future. All students taking part in the project agreed that they had explored aspects of their personal, social and emotional development on the way to their finished piece.

## PERSONAL AND SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT

Personal and Social Development (PSD) has been introduced to the Year 7 to 10 Curriculum. Students spend one term taking part in weekly PSD sessions with coordinator Ms Tracy Healy. The sessions are designed to complement other courses in the Sampford House curriculum.

The program was introduced to supplement the teaching of life skills and covers a range of issues relating to adolescence and family life. Year 7 students explore friendship, positive thinking and self talk; Year 8 students complete tasks relating to balancing homework and extracurricular activities and family relationships; Year 9 topics include body image, decision making; and leadership is the focus for Year 10.

# PERCEPTUAL MOTOR PROGRAM POSITIVE OUTCOMES FOR ALL

The Perceptual Motor Program (PMP) is a weekly physical education activity for students from Kindergarten to Year 1. Currently in its third year under the directorship of Miss Donna Carr, Junior School Sports Coordinator, the programme allows students, parents and teachers to work together.

Each Friday class groups attend a PMP session in the Joan M Garde Cultural Centre. The children work in small groups with teachers and parent volunteers. They take part in a series of guided activities which assist fitness, balance, coordination and locomotion. Special equipment such as ladders, balance beams, crawling tunnels and various sized balls makes the activities fun.

Motor outcomes, perception outcomes and skill outcomes are the three focuses of PMP. Children can achieve improvement and success in language, problem solving, memory and confidence as well as physical education skills.
